Tenant Defense Hotline - (585) 504-6195

- Volunteer Legal Services Project of Monroe County (VLSP) runs a tenant hotline Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Tenants who have received court papers, notices from their landlords, warrants of evictions, or who have questions about their rights can call the hotline.
- Individuals who contact the hotline complete an intake. If they have court, their case is sent to one of the organizations (Volunteer Legal Services Project, Legal Assistance of Western New York, or Legal Aid Society) for representation in court.
- VLSP provides legal advice and information after completing an intake.
- VLSP through volunteers assists tenants with lease negotiations, demand for repairs, and other requests to landlord.

Tenant Defense Website https://www.tenantdefense.org/

- Tenants can apply for services through the website. Once they apply, they will receive a call from the Hotline to discuss their issues and complete their intake.
- There is very basic information on the website that the laws have changed and that individuals may be eligible for representation.

Tenant Defense Project: Representation in Court

- Tenants who do not get to the Hotline prior to court, can attend court and complete an intake there.
- Legal service providers are on-site when court is scheduled.

Tenant Defense Project: Eligibility Criteria

- Tenant must reside in Monroe County.
- Priority is given to those tenants who have received court papers or warrants of eviction.
- Priority is given to those tenants under 50% of Area Median Income.

Representing Tenants In Court

Majority of Cases:

Nonpayment eviction proceedings

- Tenants facing loss of income during COVID
- Entitled to protection under NY law

Best Case Scenario

- Income has returned + rent is affordable
- Only back rent owed

Representing Tenants in Court - Nonpayment Cases

Worse Case Scenario:

- Tenant's income never recovered to pre-covid earnings
- Rent no longer affordable
- Lack of Available + Affordable
- Tenant's apt has health and safety violations LL won't fix
- Tenant not eligible for back rent relief



Focus on Eviction Prevention

Tenant Defense Project (TDP):

- 1 TDP Partners: Volunteer Legal Services Project, Legal Assistance of Western NY, The Legal Aid Society of Rochester
- 2 Our project was implemented quickly but we have had great success representing any person in Monroe County facing eviction. With the work of our offices and the City Wide Tenant Union very few people were evicted in Rochester during the pandemic
- A first of its kind program in the nation as far as it's level of representation and breadth of the population we serve
- 4 Eviction cases ++: we also take calls about illegal lockouts, utility shutoffs, and bad living conditions

Lack of Safe and (Truly) Affordable Housing in Rochester

This is a complex issue that we could spend many hours on it has its roots in federal, state and local policies that were both racist and classist.

As we deal with this problem as attorneys trying to prevent homelessness we see a cycle of people who are being evicted having few choices of homes to move in to that both meet their needs and are affordable.

Moving in an emergency situation like eviction often just moves the emergency down the road a ways because people are forced to move into substandard housing.

Major Issues in Eviction Proceedings: Habitability

Many tenants in the City of Rochester have problems in the homes they rent. These problems can range from a slow drain to ceilings that have fallen in from water leakage; from having no screens on the windows to no heat, no hot water, and rodent infestations.

The City of Rochester takes an interest in these issues in their division of Building and Zoning. Inspectors respond to complaints and work with landlords to renew certificates of occupancy

In many cases Tenants are unable to receive rental assistance if a property is in disrepair or if the City notes them to have violations that affect "Health & Safety"

As attorneys we see many cases that come to court for eviction where the home is in disrepair. In many cases the home has violations cited by the City of Rochester.

We are working with state and local officials on how best to address this both in public policy and in the legal process.

Illegal Eviction & Utility Shutoffs

We have seen a huge uptick in illegal evictions. Cases where Landlords have unlawfully deprived a tenant or occupant of their home and their possessions. This is a crime! Even threatening to lock someone out or turn off their utilities is a crime.

The criminal nature of these acts is relatively new so we are working hard to ensure that actors at all levels understand these laws and have the ability and support to enforce them. Police officers, DA's Office, Judges.

In the meantime we are working with the City administration and the County along with social service organizations to make sure that people illegally locked out have a safe place to reside until the legal issues can be resolved or enforced.

Eviction Prevention

2020 Federal CARES Act funding

- · City and County both received allocations
- Over \$10 million allocated to-date for eviction prevention

Primary eviction prevention initiatives funded:

- Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative 1.0: rent arrears funding

Outcomes to Date

Eviction Prevention Pilot Initiative (EPPI) 1.0

- Over 1,944 tenants received emergency rent assistance
- Total rent payments, over \$5,072,906

Over 531 tenants/landlords received housing counseling

Continuing Challenges

Approximately 25% of tenants still behind on rent as of March

Per surveys of landlords conducted by Harvard and County

State Eviction moratorium expires May 1st

Courts have already begun to reopen for some case types

CDC Moratorium is extended through June 30th

Landlords missing significant income

- Difficulty keeping up with mortgage and taxes
- · Deferring maintenance

Announcing: EPPI 2.0 Program

Opened on April 1st

- · County and City co-funding the Eviction Prevention program
 - Network of 13 contracted non-profits to administer funding
 - Landlords can apply on behalf of tenant, with tenant consent

Basic Tenant Eligibility Requirements

1. Income Qualified, by either:

- ✓ Annual income at 80% AMI or below
- ✓ Current month income at 80% AMI or below

2. Documented COVID Impact, by either:

- ✓ Qualified for unemployment
- ✓ "...reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced other financial hardship due, directly or indirectly, to the COVID-19 outbreak"

3. Documented Risk of Homelessness or Housing Instability, by any of:

- ✓ Past due utility bill, past due rent notice, eviction notice
- ✓ Unsafe or unhealthy housing conditions
- √ "Any other evidence of such risk"

Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Up to 12 months back rent
 - ✓ Amount documented by landlord
- 2. Up to 3 months future rent
 - ✓ Only if household can't afford ongoing rent
 - ✓ 2 months for 50-80% AMI
 - ✓ 3 months for 0-50% AMI

Note: utilities only eligible if included in the rent

Applying for EPPI 2.0

211 will be main point of entry for program

- Will distribute applicants to agencies by:
 - o Tenant choice
 - o Closest proximity to residence
 - o Agency's specialized population, if known:
 - Landlord applicants: Providence Housing
 - Spanish speakers: Ibero
 - New Americans: Refugees Helping Refugees
 - Domestic Violence Survivors: Willow
 - 14609 Zip Code: Connected Communities

Program Launch Timeline

Applications opened on April 1st

 Applicants should collect needed documentation to prepare for eligibility process

Call 211 for pre-screening

- New callback feature so don't need to wait on hold
 But make sure to pick up the unknown number caller!
- Open 24 hours a day, phone line is less busy at odd hours

Additional Supports – ESG and CDBG Rental Assistance

These funds are able to complement and be used in conjunction with the new ERAP/EPPI 2.0 Program

Funds can be used to help with relocation. Can pay for security deposit and some rental assistance

Can help stabilize housing by funding up to six (6) months of back rent and more funding going forward.

Reserved for the lowest incomes, special populations and those that are at imminent danger of eviction

Additional Supports - SNAP

Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program

- 1 in every 7 Monroe County residents is in receipt of SNAP. DHS currently has 66,000 SNAP cases. Many SNAP recipients are older adults or families who are employed, yet still rely on SNAP to supplement their food purchases. SNAP issues electronic benefits once a month via a debit card that can be used by the recipient to purchase food items.
- The Families First Act (FFA) Federal Law was passed which included funding to states to provide supplemental SNAP benefits to address food insecurity for low-income households receiving SNAP during the COVID-19 pandemic. Since March of 2020, households not already receiving the maximum allotment for their household size received monthly supplements to bring them to the maximum amount. In 2020, on average, \$18.6M in SNAP benefits (a 26% increase over the 2019 monthly average of \$14.7 million) were issued to Monroe County residents each month and spent throughout our community

Additional Supports - HEAP

Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)

HEAP provides a grant to assist with the cost of heating during the cold winter months. Tenant must have responsibility for heat account

Basic HEAP opened in November and Emergency HEAP opened in January

For Households with a shut-off threat; 2 additional "Emergency" benefits are also available

Other utility-related benefits:

- Emergency Utility Assistance -- Eligible applicants can apply to have last four months of RG&E/utility company arrears paid. Bills for SSI recipients can be guaranteed for 6 months (GPP).
- Cooling Assistance provide a vendor installed window or portable air conditioner for applicants with a medically documented condition exacerbated by extreme heat.
- Clean & Tune HEAP eligible homeowners can have their furnace cleaned and tuned annually by an authorized vendor.
- Heating Equipment Repair & Replacement HEAP eligible homeowners can have their furnace repaired or replaced at no charge by an authorized vendor.

Additional Supports - Child Care

Income Eligible Day Care

- Subsidy program for care provided while parent/guardian is working
 - No minimum hours required; care can be provided for hours of work only and up to 1 hour travel time.
 - Care provided while attending school (vocational, high school, 2 or 4-year programs) can be covered after the parent/guardian works at least 17.5 hours per week.
 - Care provided while parents, under 21, are still enrolled in high school (must maintain 85% attendance) can be covered without any work requirements.
